Study Guide: Be a Media Master!

Topic: How Full Is It? Evaluating Social Media Posts

Grade Level: 4th Grade

Introduction

This guide will help students learn to evaluate social media posts by asking three key questions:

- Is it truthful?
- Is it hurtful?
- Is it helpful?

Through discussions and activities, students will explore how to become responsible Media Masters by making thoughtful decisions online.

Key Vocabulary

- Media Master: A person who thinks carefully about their actions online and offline.
- Helpful: Making someone's life better or sharing something kind.
- Hurtful: Being mean or unkind to someone.
- **Truthful:** Based on facts and evidence.
- UnTruthful: Not based on facts and evidence.

Discussion Questions

- 1. What does it mean to ask, "How FULL is it?" about a social media post?
- 2. Why is it important to know if a post is truthful, hurtful, or helpful?
- 3. Can you think of an example of a helpful post you've seen or shared?
- 4. What should you do if a post is hurtful or not truthful?
- 5. Why is it important to pause and think before liking, sharing, or commenting on a post?

Activities

1. Sorting Social Media Posts

- Materials: Index cards with examples of social media posts (helpful, hurtful, truthful and untruthful).
- Action:
 - Divide the class into small groups.
 - Give each group a set of cards.

 Ask them to sort the cards into four piles: Helpful, Hurtful, Truthful, or unTruthful

EXAMPLES OF SOCIAL MEDIA POSTS - set one

Helpful

- 1. "Just learned a great trick for remembering multiplication facts! Try singing them to your favorite song—it really helps! \[\] \
- 2. "Feeling sad? Remember, you're not alone. Talk to a friend or an adult you trust. You matter! ♥"
- 3. "Reminder: Drink water and take breaks while doing homework. Your brain needs fuel! \triangle !!!"

Hurtful

- 4. "Omg, look at this outfit! Who let them leave the house like this?!"
- 5. "You're so bad at this game. Just quit already. "
- **6.** "No one likes you. Just stop posting."

Truthful

- 7. "Did you know that honey never spoils? Archaeologists found pots of honey in ancient Egyptian tombs that were still good! ""
- 8. "The sun is actually a star! It looks bigger because it's the closest star to Earth.

Untruthful

- 9. "If you eat a watermelon seed, a watermelon will grow in your stomach! 🌭 😱 "
- 10. "Breaking news: Scientists just proved that unicorns are real!
- Discussion:
 - O Why did your group sort the cards this way?
 - O How would you handle each type of post as a Media Master?

MORE - EXAMPLES OF SOCIAL MEDIA POSTS - set two

Helpful

- 1. "If your friend is feeling left out, invite them to play! Including others makes everyone feel good. ""
- 2. "Lost something? Try retracing your steps—sometimes your brain remembers where it was last! \(\sqrt{2} \) "

Hurtful

- 5. "Haha! Look at their messy hair! They look like they just rolled out of bed. 😂"
- 6. "Nobody wants you on their team. You're too slow. 🟃 🂨 "

Truthful

- 8. "The moon doesn't make its own light. It shines because the sun's light reflects off it! "

Untruthful

- 9. "If you eat too many carrots, you'll turn orange! / "\cup""

MORE - EXAMPLES OF SOCIAL MEDIA POSTS - set three

Helpful

- 1. "If someone drops their books, help them pick them up! A small kindness can make a big difference.
- 2. "Feeling nervous before a test? Take a deep breath and remind yourself—you've got this! ** __"
- 3. "If you're stuck on a hard math problem, try drawing it out. Pictures can help your brain figure it out! \@"

Hurtful

- 4. "That joke wasn't funny at all. You're so bad at telling jokes. "
- 5. "Your singing is awful. Stop trying.
- 6. "Ew! Your lunch looks gross. I would NEVER eat that! 6."

Truthful

- 7. "Did you know butterflies taste with their feet? That's how they know which plants are good to eat! **W**
- 8. "Elephants can 'talk' to each other by making sounds so low that humans can't hear them!

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Untruthful

- 9. "If you swallow gum, it stays in your stomach for seven years! 😲 🍬 "
- 10. "Goldfish only have a 3-second memory. They forget everything super fast! <a> •

Teacher Note: Use this activity to emphasize empathy, responsibility, and critical thinking. Encourage students to reflect on how they can apply these skills to their daily online interactions.
